On Sunday, June 18th, collections were made after the Services in Hambleden Church, in behalf of the Funds of the Diocesan Board of Education. In consequence of the heavy demands made upon the Board by School Managers in all parts of the Diocese, for help in meeting the requirements of the Elementary Education Act which was passed last year, the Bishop has made an Appeal through a Pastoral Letter to the Clergy and Churchwardens, one year earlier than would otherwise have been the case. ## SOUTH BUCKS FRIENDLY SOCIETY.

The Church was prettily and cheerfully decorated with ferns and flowers, and spoke of the bright hope of the dear departed, and of the joy which the survivors are sure that he is feeling in "the better Land" to which his Heavenly Father has so suddenly taken him. A cross of white roses and wreaths of flowers were laid upon the coffin by the hands of those who loved him so dearly. May we in our turn "go to him!"
