

# THE NATIONAL SCHOOLS.

On the 1st of January, Miss Williams undertook the charge of the School at Frieth. The School has been well attended during the month both by its regular scholars, and by the lace-making girls who attend in the afternoon only. Of these girls about 25 names are on the books. We have every reason to hope that teacher, children and parents, will be satisfied with the progress of the School.

On the following day, Mr. T. West entered on his new duties as Assistant Master in Hambleden School. The attendance of children has not been so good latterly, owing to the great prevalence of bad colds and coughs, and to the very unfavourable state of the weather. The promised quarterly cards have made their first appearance. We hope they will prove interesting and useful to the parents.

#### CHURCH MISSIONS.

A Missionary Meeting was held in Hambleden Schoolroom, on Tuesday evening, January 9th. The evening was unfortunately very dark, but the large room was well filled. The Rev. Canon Lloyd, Organizing Secretary in Bucks for the Propagation Society, kindly came all the way from Chalfont St. Peter's, and brought with him some interesting pictures of scenes in Burmah. The audience were very attentive to his address, and interested with it. Two fresh boxes were taken away at the close of the meeting. The collection amounted to £2 19s.  $2\frac{1}{2}$ d.

We subjoin a statement of accounts of our Parochial contributions in the year 1871. The total amount is much less than formerly, owing to our having lost a few large contributors from the parish. There is one item in the Receipts to which we would call attention, "waste paper, 9s. 11d." This was a hundred-weight of old paper, letters, envelopes, scraps of various kinds, torn up into small pieces, which in that state are taken at a paper mill at the rate of 12s. per cwt. It does not matter how small the pieces are. If any of our friends therefore will, instead of burning old paper, tear it up and convey it to the Rectory for the Missionary Bag, it will be thankfully received, and they will be rendering useful service with that which would otherwise be wasted.
