The Diocesan Conference held at Oxford, on October 1st and 2nd, seems to have been highly successful. It was very popular with the Laity, who attended in large numbers, and shewed quite as much interest in the debated questions as the Clergy. One great result of Diocesan Conferences will be that Laymen and Clergymen will be more drawn together to work for the good of the Church; another, that Convocation and the Houses of Parliament will be better able to know the mind of the Church before legislation is resorted to.

Oct. 5th was observed in our Church as a day of thanksgiving for the harvest. There were of course the usual decorations made, with no little care, taste and skill. In these and other respects we did what we could to make clear the leading thought of the day. The Psalms and Lessons were selected, as they may be, by permission of the Bishop. The eye saw and the ear heard. Perhaps at no season of the year are we more thankful for the "Ancient and Modern Hymn Book." Those inspiriting Hymns with words that seem to supply you with all that may be wanting in your own thankfulness, and with music that is worthy of the words, greatly help to the sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. We had 23 Communicants at the celebration, which number should have been greater on such an occasion.

The Offertory was altogether satisfactory, and indicative of a proper feeling, £10 0s. 4d., which with 11s. 11d. collected in the afternoon, made the sum of £10 12s. 3d. We are sorry that such is the pressure put upon Medmenham this year, that it cannot make so many collections for objects outside the Parish. The above collections of necessity had to be made for the School, and their liberality enables us to announce that we are very nearly at the end of our task.
