#### HOLY WEEK AND EASTER DAY.

The Daily Services at Hambleden were well attended. There were not so many persons present on Good Friday morning as we have seen. If, through inadvertence, any of the labouring men were kept at work, as has been alleged, till 12 o'clock instead of 10 o'clock, and this should meet the eye of their employers, we doubt not that they will take care another year to rectify the error. A considerable number of persons availed themselves of the Afternoon Services, but we have not as yet reached the point, which is desirable to attain, when all the Parishioners shall feel that on that Solemn Day the Parish Church is the place where they must spend in meditation and prayer the hours of our Lord's bitter sufferings for us.

Easter Day was a joyful day. So large a number of Communicants probably has never been known to communicate in one day in the Parish. At Hambleden there were at 7.30 a.m., 43; at mid-day, 73. At Frieth at 8 a m. there were 46; at mid-day, 22; making a total of 184. On the following Sunday there were 13 in addition at Skirmett. Let us thank God and take courage.

### THE ROGATION DAYS AND ASCENSION DAY.

Ascension Day falls on May 14th. There will be the usual Services on that great Holy Day, viz., Holy Communion at 5 a.m. for those who are obliged to be busy in the middle of the day; full Morning Service with Sermon and second celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30 a.m.; full Evening Service with Sermon at 7 p.m.

On the Rogation Days, which are the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension Day, there will be short Special Services, as there were last year. On Monday the subject will be "God's Blessing on the Growing Crops;" on Tuesday, "Missions: both Home and Foreign;" on Wednesday, "The Spiritual Improvement of our own Parish."

# Medmenham Corner.

## BIRTHS.

March 18th, Mrs. Jos. Shirvell, of a daughter. April 6th, Mrs. G. Mason, of a daughter.

The observance of Lent, and especially of the Holy Week, has been encouraging, if we may judge by the attendance at Church on week days. We have every reason to believe that people are finding the solemn season of the Church as needful to them as the more joyous.

Easter Day, as was right, called large congregations to the Church. The Early Celebration was better attended than last year. 36 persons in all communicated during the day. The Services went heartily. We are sure the choir tried their best to make the singing helpful and acceptable. No trouble was grudged or pains spared to render the decorations instructive and tasteful.

The usual Vestry Meetings have been held. The First on March 25th for Parish business, at which Messrs. Thomas Dorrell and John Franklin were nominated Overseers of the Poor; Mr. Philip Hobbs appointed Surveyor of the Highways; Joseph Bird and Joseph Lowe named as eligible to serve the office of constable; and a highway rate of 6d. in the pound allowed to the Surveyor. The Second on April 7th (Tuesday in Easter week), for business connected with the Church, at which the Church-wardens' accounts were produced, examined, and approved, shewing a balance in hand; Mr. William Hobbs re-elected Church-warden for the Vicar and Mr. Philip Hobbs for the Parish, and agreed that a subscription be asked for when required by the Church-wardens.

May 11th, 12th, and 13th, are Rogation Days, or Days of Prayer, for God's blessing, among other things, upon the seed lately cast into the ground. There will be Evening Service at 8 o'clock each day when the ancient homily will be read in parts.

May 14th is Holy Thursday, or Ascension Day. Morning Service will be at 11 a.m., after which the Holy Communion will be celebrated. The Evening Service will be at 8 o'clock.
