HAMBLEDEN SCHOOL FESTIVITIES.

On Tuesday, Jan. 6, the Feast of the Epiphany, all the children attending Hambleden Day School and Sunday School, had a grand Entertainment in the Schoolrooms. At 3.30 they sat down, 168 in number, to tea, bread and butter, cake, and jam. This ended, a book of some kind was presented to every boy and girl on the Sunday School books. They were purchased by a gift from an old Sunday Schoolar, Mr. Richard White, formerly of Skirmett. When he was a boy he attended Hambleden Sunday School, and from this school, the then Rector, Rev. H. C. Ridley, got him a place of service in a gentleman's family. He had all his life through a desire to show his gratitude to his old place of learning, and last summer sent the present Rector a gift of £5 for the benefit of the Sunday Scholars.

After this, Mr. Schwabe's prizes were given to the children who by most regular attendance and cleanliness had merited them. When these interesting matters were concluded, Punch and Judy was performed, to the intense delight of the children. They all thanked Mr. Punch for his performance, but some said, "Do it again."

COMMUNICANTS', TEA.

This was given in Hambleden Schoolrooms on the evening of Wednesday, Jan. 14. All Communicants of all classes attending Hambleden Church were invited. Some of all classes came, numbering just 70. Various ladies kindly undertook the care of the several tables. When tea was ended, a hymn was sung, a short prayer offered, and then the assembled company listened for half-an-hour to a very earnest, interesting, and profitable address delivered by the Rev. Canon Randall, Rector of Sandhurst, and formerly Rector of Newbury. Every one seemed highly gratified with the whole Entertainment.

The funeral of John Henry Lane, on Sunday, Jan. 25, was very solemn and affecting. His illness had been painfully short, and he was universally respected and beloved. From his early boyhood he

had been a member of the Church Choir, and for several years had been an active leading member of the body of Ringers. The Choir therefore attended the funeral, and the Ringers chimed it into Church, and afterwards rang muffled peals. The chanting of the Psalms, and singing of Hymns, (in Church, No. 117, and at the grave, No. 197) with the long procession of surplices and black scarves, produced a very solemn and picturesque effect. There were many besides his own near and dear relatives, whose streaming eyes testified their regard for their departed friend; and all the vast assemblage behaved themselves with true reverent decorum. He rests from his labours. May we labour like him, and at length rest with him.

LENT.

It is proposed to commence the Daily Morning Service when Lent arrives. On Ash-Wednesday the service will be at 10.30 a.m., but usually at 10.5 a.m. During Lent there will be daily Evening Service also, at 7 p.m. On Wednesday Evenings, after Ash-Wednesday, there will be a Sermon preached by some friends beyond the Parish.

The Confirmation will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 10, at 11 a.m. The friends, especially the God-parents, of the candidates, are invited to be present, and by their prayers draw down God's blessing in abundance on those who are confirmed.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS.

It is to be hoped that our people will remember the candidates in their prayers, and not hinder them by worldliness—nor let it be forgotten that it is ordered by the Church "Every one shall have a God-father, or a God-mother, as a witness of their Confirmation." Tuesday, February 10th is the day, at 11 a.m.
