With the New Year can we not begin a new work ? or at least revive a work which was begun more than a twelvemonth ago and then was staid for want of funds. We allude to the improvement of seating in the Church. One seat out of ten or eleven that are required has been in use for about a year. There is £6 12s. 3d. in Messrs. Simonds and Co.'s Bank, to the account of the Medmenham Church Improvement Fund. The new seat has not been paid for because the builder says, "If you pay me for one separately I must charge a much higher sum in proportion than for all done as one work." Naturally, therefore, it appears advisable to have the whole work done, if possible, in one contract. The question then is, shall we do it ? It would make the whole Church equally well seated, which is much to be wished. It is an undertaking to be sure, but like many other undertakings, it is not insurmountable. Since Sept. 17th, 1876, when the Organ was erected, there has been no particular call for Church expenditure. We have had rest and breathing time. A short time since, the Rev. Canon Ridley, Rural Dean, made an official visitation of the Church in the presence of the Churchwardens, It was agreed by them that the proposed scheme is a good one and when carried out will be a great improvement. To re-float the scheme the Vicar will add two guineas to his former subscription. In the Magazine for February, 1880, accurate information will be found touching the money required.

Fine weather makes all the difference to the due observation of the Christmas Festival; we had it indeed in perfection. There was a marked advance in the number of early Communicants, and the other Services were well attended. All thanks are due to those who assisted in the decoration of the Church.

At the Missionary meeting on the 15th December, there was a good roomful. The collection was 16s. 1d.
