We had known for some months that Miss Scott-Murray was in such a state of health as to cause her friends the gravest anxiety. The announcement, therefore, of her death did not come as a surprise. It is an event, however, that will be felt by all who knew her, and which the people in this Parish will sorrow over. She was known for her kindly gentle disposition and beneficent goodness. Her support in very good work, whether for Church, School, or Parish, was always ready and always substantial. Though for many years separated from us by residence, she still manifested the warmest interest in the place. She wished to hear of the welfare of the Parishioners, and to join them in their efforts for good. This was so to such an extent that at the moment it is not easy to see how we shall be able to manage without the help that from her was regularly forthcoming.

There is one alteration in the Church Services to which it is right to call particular attention. On the third Sunday in each month the Holy Communion will be celebrated at 8 a.m., instead of at noon as heretofore. This is in accordance with the desire of some who have found it difficult to attend at the later hour. Upon the distinct advantage of the earlier hour much might be said. We can only trust that many will make trial of it.

The School will be re-opened when permission is given by the authorities whose duty it is to care for the health of the district.
