

The Diocesan Inspection of our Schools in Religious Knowledge has taken place, and we have much pleasure in printing the Reports,

which on the whole are certainly of a satisfactory character.

The children seemed to know their work, and to take an intelligent interest in it, and the answering was well distributed throughout each class, as a rule. Standard I. appears the weakest. The Written Work was creditable throughout, though I thought that of Standard IV. relatively the weakest. The order and general tone of the School are very good."

SKIRMETT INFANTS' SCHOOL.—"The children answered fairly well, and seemed to be creditably acquainted with the main facts of the Scripture stories they had learned. They know the Creed and the Lord's Prayer very fairly, and some of the Commandments, but greater care should be taken to see that they have got exactly the right words. United recitation of hymns, texts, &c., should be slower, and more attention should be paid to stops. The general order seems to be improved, and the children shew that they have not merely been taught by rote, but have some understanding of what they have learnt."

We venture to think that the most pleasing feature in this year's examination was the *general high level* attained by the children. It has often happened heretofore that one or two clever children in each Standard have done nearly all the answering. That was not the case this year, and we were very glad to notice a general proficiency throughout the Schools. This is certainly borne out by the Inspector's Reports.

#### FRIETH CHURCH.

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#### HOLY WEEK AND EASTER.

There will be three opportunities on Easter Day at the Parish Church of coming to the Holy Communion, and we hope that all Communicants will attend at one or other of them, for it is the greatest Feast Day of all the year, when no invited guest should be absent. There will also be Offertory Collections on that day for Church Expenses, and if those who attend the Parish Church will bear this in mind and give as they are able, there ought to be no debt upon the Church this year.
