It had got much out of order and some parts of it could not be used. The cost is £20. There is to be a collection at the Parish Church towards this extra expense but as we fear the result will not altogether pay the debt, we hope that any of our friends or parishioners who have not an opportunity of contributing to the Offertory Collection, will send a donation either to the Rector; or to Mr. Mason, Churchwarden.
