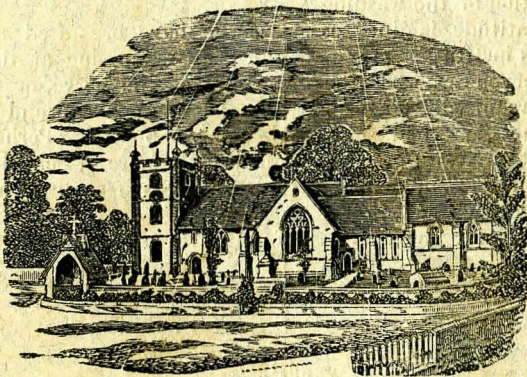

### HAMBLEDEN PARISH NURSE.

We gladly accede to a request to call the attention of our readers to this valuable institution. The rules may be had on application either to Mrs. Muirhead, the Secretary, or to Mrs. Holt Beever, the Treasurer. The parishioners are invited to become annual subscribers on the following terms: Labourers, 2s. (*i.e.* roughly speaking  $\frac{1}{2}$ d. a week); Artisans and School Teachers, 3s.; Farmers and Tradesmen, 5s.; Gentry, 10s.

To subscribers, fees for the Nurse per week for these four classes are respectively 1s., 2s., 5s., and 10s.; to non-subscribers, 3s. 6d., 4s. 6d., 7s. 6d., and £1, with, of course, board and lodging.

Two other rules we will quote:

5.—“The services of the Nurse may also be obtained within two miles of her home for occasional nursing, dressing burns, wounds, etc., on the following terms to subscribers: 4d. and board for a single day or night of twelve hours, and 1d. per hour for single visits. These fees will be doubled to non-subscribers.”

14.—“When attending a cottagers' wife the Nurse will be expected to do all that is required for the care of her patient's family, with the exception of the washing.”

Great gratitude is due to those who have organised and who manage this institution. We all want a little nursing at times, and it is not everyone who has the gift, the tact, the nerve, or the time for what is required. Then many of us are so ignorant and so helpless in sickness, or when some accident has happened. Perhaps some day girls (at any rate) may be taught a little more in School of such practical matters; till that day it is a great boon to have a trained nurse within reach.

Application for the services of the Nurse should be made to Mrs. Muirhead.
