Parents who wish to have children baptised should apply to the Clergy, Clerk, or Sextons, for forms to fill up the name, etc., not later than the day before they wish to bring the children to Church.

If for any special reason it is desired, Baptism can be arranged for at Matins. The Rector prefers to baptise at Morning or Evening Prayer on Sunday to any other time as being in accordance with the Rubrics at the beginning of the Service. He considers that these Rubrics do not receive the attention they deserve.

FRIETH CHOIR EXCURSION.

(From our special correspondent.)

Monday, June 22nd, will long be remembered as a "Red Letter Day" in the annals of the Frieth Choir. On this day the Choir and Sunday School Teachers went for their Annual Outing, and there was only one thing lacking to make it as perfect as it is possible for all mundane things to be, that was the presence of the Rector, who, to the very great regret of all, was unavoidably absent. The place chosen this year was the Crystal Palace, and the pleasures of the day were further enhanced by a most kind invitation from Thos. Dewey, Esq., the kind and genial "Prudential" Chief, and father of the esteemed Curate of Frieth, the Rev. Stanley D. Dewey, to visit and have tea with him at Bromley. A start was made from Frieth at 7 o'clock, when the party, 33 in number, in charge of Mr. Dewey, were conveyed to Marlow in Mr. Sworder's brakes, the Palace being reached about 11 o'clock. After a short ramble through the Palace, the party assembled for dinner at 12 o'clock. Dinner being ended and having arranged to meet at the Penge entrance at 3 o'clock, the party dispersed, to wander at will over the Palace and grounds. Some visited the carriage exhibition and evinced much interest in the rapid evolution and development of the Cycle, while the horseless carriages, the various types of our common humanity, the picture gallery, the monkey house and the Organ recital, all came in for their share of attention. Some made the ascent of the tower, others patronised every means of locomotion to be found in the grounds, viz. switchback railway, the roundabouts, etc., etc., while some few threaded the interstices of the Maze.

At length 3 o'clock found the party assembled outside the Palace grounds, and here a pleasant surprise was in store for them, for Mr. Dewey, Sen., himself, was in waiting with three brakes to convey them to Bromley. Mr. Dewey led the way, and took a circuitous route of some ten miles, through Anerley, West Wickham, and Pickhurst. Time would fail to tell of the pleasures of this most delightful and enjoyable drive, over breezy uplands and fern clad heaths. West Hill, Bromley, being reached, a refreshing wash, a ramble through the beautiful grounds and gardens, and then they assembled on the lawn where a most sumptous tea was waiting for them, with a most profuse abundance of strawberries and cream. The party, having done ample justice to all the good things and luxuries provided for them, took another short ramble through the grounds and then assembled on the lawn at 6 o'clock to take leave of their kind host and hostess. West, on behalf of the Choir, thanked Mr. and Mrs. Dewey for their kindness and then, with ringing cheers for Mr. and Mrs. Dewey, the happy party commenced their homeward journey. There is no noteworthy

incident to record of the homeward journey; it only remains to say that, though there were many juveniles, owing to the kind care and energetic solicitude of Mr. Dewey for the comfort and safety of his charge, at no time had there been any lost or wandering sheep, but by 11 o'clock p.m. all were safe again in the home fold, there to muse on the pleasing reminiscences of one of the happiest days on record.
